## PAKISTAN'S IS ON THE VERGE OF BANKRUPTCY

As the country's Economic situation is facing a dire future with no immediate positive outlook. Pakistan rupee (PKR) is on a 'free fall' as it crossed 212 per USD on June 21. Whereas, Pakistan's foreign exchange reserves have depleted to a critical level and the country has less than six weeks of import remaining. The reserves are currently below USD 9 billion, according to a report published in Pakistan Tribune.

The Corruption is on-going issue in the government, claiming to take initiatives against it, particularly in the government and lower levels of police forces. More factors include political instability, security concerns, energy shortages, burden of foreign debts, are extremely deteriorating.
